

The Atlanta Braves defended their 2018 NL East Crown by clinching the division this past weekend.

Most experts did not have the Braves winning the division in 2019, mostly taking into account all the money the Philadelphia Phillies spent in the offseason. Those Phillies most likely will not make the playoffs at all.

As October approaches, there is still the business of Atlanta setting their playoff roster. The Braves roster suffered a ton of injuries in the last two months of the season. Nick Markakis, Ender Inciarte, Austin Riley, Charlie Culberson and Johan Camargo all spent time in the Injured List and Atlanta will be without Culberson and Camargo in the first round and maybe throughout the playoffs.

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HEALTH SYSTEM ATHLETIC TRAINERS KEEP STUDENT ATHLETES SAFE BEYOND THE SIDELINES

Whistles chirp as players scrimmage on the soccer and football fields. Runners stretch before taking to the track. An ace is served across the net. The cracking of bats as batters practice their swing. The swoosh of the net as the buzzer sounds.

Whether it's fall or spring sports season, the Southeast Georgia Health System certified athletic trainers are dedicated to providing area athletes with the best care possible by preventing, recognizing and managing sports injuries, including concussions. As Brunswick High School's athletic trainer, Chantal Pierre, ATC is trained to spot potential injuries and ensure the well-being of student athletes who may one day be awarded a Heisman trophy, or win a World Series pennant.

"There are a lot of injuries, and it can be anything from simple sprains and strains, to much more complex injuries like concussions," Ms. Pierre said. "But that's why we're here, to make sure injured kids are safe to return to play."

Ms. Pierre is one of five athletic trainers who work for the Health System and partner with area high schools to monitor injuries, speed up recoveries and make sure student athletes are playing safely. Marissa Turturro, LAT, ATC, serves at Glynn Academy, Adam Norman, MS, ATC-L works with Frederica Academy, Shonta Houston, ATC, at McIntosh County Academy and community liaison Becky Joyner, M.S., ATC, PES. Trained and certified to recognize and treat sports-related injuries, the athletic trainers are licensed by the State of Georgia, and supervised by Beau Sasser, M.D., board-certified orthopedic surgeon with Summit Sports Medicine & Orthopaedic Surgery, and medical director of the Health System's Sports Medicine program.

Paul Trumbull, P.T., MBA, rehabilitation and sports medicine director, said while injury prevention and management are key components of the athletic trainers' day-to-day responsibilities, there are many more duties. "They primarily make sure the student athletes stay healthy," Mr. Trumbull said. "It's not just injury management, but injury prevention as well. To some degree, they also play an important role with nutrition, conditioning and hydration."


Each school has their own training rooms, equipped with many supplies. "Everything from exam tables to nose plugs for nose bleeds," described Mr. Trumbull. However, athletic training is much more than wrapping tape around ankles and handing out nose plugs. Knowing the student athletes on a personal level is crucial to identifying the warning signs of possibly serious injuries like concussions.

Ms. Turturro said, "As athletic trainers we are with our student athletes every day, so when they are upset over an injury we are their support system, and a liaison with their doctor. A big part of what we do is also education. We help them understand their injury and the treatment and rehabilitation prescribed by their doctor, and teach them how to take care of themselves with proper conditioning, warm up, cool down and nutrition to help prevent injury."

Athletic trainers do a lot of planning and coordinating every year. "We meet at least monthly and discuss medical issues, coverage for events, injury reports, county pre-participation exams and coordination of care for athletes," explained Dr. Sasser. "I also work closely with the coaches to make sure they understand our policies and protocols." Athletic trainers also work with local emergency management services to stay up-to-date on the latest health-industry trends and best practices. Ms. Pierre said, "That gives everyone a chance to ask questions and understand the roles we all have while managing emergencies during the game or practice, as well as discuss new policies."


"The importance of an athletic trainer goes way beyond taping a sprain or pulling a player off the field for a concussion. The trainers are in constant communication between the athlete, family, coaches and the treating physician in order to understand the treatment of an injury and the time to return to play." According to Dr. Sasser, this continuum of care is invaluable. "I truly believe that the Southeast Georgia Health System athletic trainer program has prevented more serious injuries than we will ever know," he said. 



n all too frequent headline in college football today is player x from named institution has entered the NCAA Transfer Portal.

Listed Below are the rules according to the NCAA pulled from their website:

Transfer Process:

Academic year in residence: Under the basic transfer regulations, you must spend an academic year in residence at the school to which you are transferring.

If you transfer from a four-year college to an NCAA school, you must complete one academic year in residence at the new school before you can play for or receive travel expenses from the new school, unless you qualify for a transfer exception or waiver.

To satisfy an academic year in residence, you must be enrolled in and successfully complete a full-time program of studies for two-full semesters or threefull quarters. Summer school terms and part-time enrollment do not count toward fulfilling an academic year in residence.

Exception: If you meet a legislated exception, it means a specific regulation will not apply to you.

The school to which you are transferring determines whether you are eligible and has the authority to apply exceptions.

you transfer from a four-year school, you the NCAA. may be immediately eligible to compete at your new school if you meet ALL the following conditions:

You are academically and athletically eligible at your previous four-year school.

You receive a transfer-release school.

Waiver: An action that sets aside an NCAA rule because a specific, extraordinary circumstance prevents you from meeting the rule. An NCAA school may file a waiver on your behalf; you cannot file a waiver for yourself. The school does not administer the waiver, the conference office or NCAA does.

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
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or the better part of a decade at the wide receiver position, there has been almost a direct correlation between a player's ability to perform on the field and his antics off it. The crazier the antics the more talented the player must be, otherwise why put up with it.

That said, it's somewhat poetic that on the same day Antonio Brown is turning in a diva performance the entire cast of "Real Housewives of New York City" would've been proud of, Julio Jones is signed a contract making him the highest paid wide receiver in the NFL.

I say this because when a player like Jones- someone who doesn't throw sideline rants, blames losses on his lack of targets, or post videos on social media demeaning the organization he plays for- becomes the highest paid, it almost catches you by surprise. (During the stretch when Jones wasn't getting many red zone targets, could you have pictured him posting a video of all his touchdown catches in Atlanta followed by the words "Remember Me???" as the video fades to black? Now how about Brown?)

I'm sure Jones is more vocal behind closed doors, but if so that at least seems to be where those conversations stay. And while some may look at him holding out as diva-like behavior I have no issue with it, especially when you consider the way it's been handled by both Jones and the Falcons.

There are several different avenues to venture down when you discuss making a 30-year-old the highest

paid wideout in the league, but the real story that will have implications across the league are the terms of the extension-\$66 million over the next three years, all guaranteed.

Regardless of what side of the argument you fall on- whether contracts should be guaranteed or not- you must admit Jones' contract could be the turning point for how those contracts are handled in the NFL.

How many times have you heard of a deal stalling out not because of the length or total money involved, but because of the guaranteed dollars?

As annoying as it is, there's a reason "The number of years or total dollar amount doesn't matter, it's all about what's guaranteed" comment is ingrained in our minds. I understand why NFL money isn't guaranteed, but it's a huge hurdle that sometimes can't be overcome.

In a profession where contracts are built upon existing contracts with other players, why in the world would another player of Jones' caliber settle for anything less than a fully guaranteed contract, or at least something close to that. If I were him, I wouldn't.


I'm not saying this is something that will happen overnight, or take place for every player in the league, but the precedent has been set and I imagine there will be a line of football players waiting to follow in Jones' footsteps.

Whether or not you believe Jones is worth the money at this stage of his career, or if you think he'll have lived up to his contract five years from now may not even matter.

There's a good chance we'll look back at his signing as a change of the times and something that may alter the way the NFL handles contracts from here on out.

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
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


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



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e're all ecstatic that college football season is back.

We normally reflect on past greats and talk about their amazing performances. I think of guys that won national championships or Heisman's like Tim Tebow, Tommie Frazier, Matt Leinart, Vince Young and Ken Dorsey.

There is another side to this, people that were highly recruited but never lived up to the hype in college. We can even go far enough to say they set their program back for several years with their poor play.

The top name that comes to mind is Chris Rix.

He was in the inaugural Elite 11 QB Camp. He led the California team to victory over Florida in the CaliForida Bowl 1 at the Rose Bowl and was one of the top quarterback prospects in the nation.

Rix arrived in Tallahassee in the Fall of 2000 and was red shirted. He got to watch Chris Wienke's senior season, a Heisman-winning campaign that ended with a loss to Oklahoma in the national championship game.





Monday morning quarterbacking is a very real epidemic in sports fandom and it's certainly not limited to football fanatics.

That's where the term comes from, of course, but the desire to second guess any team's coach and manager's every move is so alluring and satisfying that it has permeated into every sport in which decisions are made.

Baseball is, of course, included. Fans of every team revel in post-correcting their favorite(?) manager's lineups, defensive alignments, rotation choices, and bullpen management.

Managers are mortal men, mind you, so mistakes can be (and are) made. I would never claim otherwise. For the record, I also do some managerial criticism from time to time.

Even reigning Mangers of the Year get criticized for anything and everything; one such person is Atlanta Braves' manager Brian Snitker, who I hear get criticized constantly by friends, by family, and by sports radio hosts.

Folks in Braves Country always have one thing or another to complain about when it comes to Snit and his managerial decision-making.

I'm not here to tell you that you can never criticize Brian Snitker again. He will, someday in the future, maybe soon, make a decision you disagree with. You are allowed to share your disagreement. But today I want to celebrate him. Because I just watched him get thrown out of a game, and I'm fired up about how much I like the guy.

The game I just watched was against the Washington Nationals. You'll know it as the horrific game

in which Charlie Culberson took a fastball off his face on a bunt attempt. Insanely, it was called a strike.

Brian Snitker really didn't like that.

MAYBE second to the Jose Urena Incident, this was far and away the most pissed off I have ever seen the usually-calm Snitker.

At the time, I was far too shaken from Culberson's injury to really appreciate the fight Snit was putting up against a godawful call.

Looking back on it now, I see the Snit that these Braves players love to play for. He was arguing about a strike, but under the surface you just knew that Snit was channeling the fear and love that the whole clubhouse has for Charlie into that tirade.

Snitker seems like a paternal figure to this team in a way that Fredi Gonzalez never was – and before you get ahead of me, he's not quite Bobby Cox either.

The Braves under Cox, whom I love, were always professional to a fault.

Snit's team is allowed to be little more expressive. There's a lot of youth and excitement on the team, but Snitker seems to encourage it. He's also going to provide a firm hand when necessary, like pulling Acuna for lack of hustle just a few weeks ago. And yet, I feel confident that Acuna wouldn't have an ill will for his skipper.

And at the end of the day, the thing that matters is that these Braves want to play for Snit. Guys like Freddie Freeman notably advocated for Snitker to get the full-time job after his interim stint a few years ago.

His bullpen usage will be what it is – he'll make whatever decisions he thinks will help the team win or will help a player in one situation or another – but the guys on the field want him filling out the lineup on a daily basis. They want to win for him. And they are.



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
