

he azaleas are in full bloom. The towering pine and flowering dogwood trees are in pristine condition. That can only mean one thing...it's time for the golf world to flock to Augusta, Ga for the 2024 Masters.

The 88th playing of the Masters Tournament officially gets underway Thursday April 11th and will hand out the coveted green jacket on Sunday at the conclusion of the final round for a "tradition unlike any other."

The Masters is always the first of the four Major Championships in the golf world and is slated for the first

full week in April each year.

The tournament that began in 1934 is considerably smaller (in terms of number of participants) than the other three championships because it's an invitational event held by the Augusta National Golf Course.

There are 20 ways that a player can be invited to participate in the exclusive Masters Tournament. Any former Masters Champion has a lifetime invitation back to Augusta. Similarly, any champion of the other three major championships in the previous five years gets an automatic invitation to the field. Although 20 ways to qualify for the Masters may seem like a lot of ways to get in the field, it's an elusive ticket.

Nineteen former Masters champions are expected to compete for the crown again in 2024 including Tiger Woods, Bubba Watson, Jordan Spieth, Scottie Scheffler, and 2023

champion Jon Rahm.

The 2020 Masters Champion Dustin Johnson set the Masters record with a -20 final card to win the only masters to not be played in April (had to be moved to November because of COVID-19).

Other former Masters Champions expected to be in the field for the 88th playing are Phil Mickelson, Sergio Garcia, and 2021 Champion

Hideki Matsuyama.

Others that get in the field because of winning one of the other three major championships in the last five years include U.S. Open Champions Wyndham Clark, Bryson DeChambeau, Matt Fitzpatrick, and Gary Woodland. British Open Champions Brian Harman, Cam Smith, Collin Morikawa, and Shane Lowry will also tee it up in Augusta.

Finally, PGA Championship winners Brooks Koepka and Justin Thomas are expected to be in the field

come April.

With less than 50 others that meet one of the 20 criteria to enter the tournament, some familiar names just make the cut.

Patrick Cantlay and Tommy Fleetwood enter the eligibility with the 18th criteria point of qualifying for the

2023 Tour Championship.

Tony Finau and Rickie Fowler come into the mix with the 17th criteria checked of "Individual winners of PGA Tour events that award a full-point allocation for the season-ending Tour Championship, from the 2023 Masters to the 2024 Masters (including fall 2023)".

Other notable names include Rory McIlroy and Neal Shipley for various check marks.

After all the minutia to set the field, the whole golf world (and many outside the golf community) will flock to the small corner of Eastern Georgia called Augusta either by physically going down Bobby Jones Expressway, or via the televisions, computer screens, or courtesy of Westwood One Sports Radio.

However, if you take in the Masters tournament, it's special, and it's a big day on Sunday when you hear Jim Nantz sets the scene poetically in his 39th Masters for CBS along with his colleague Verne Lundquist who announced that the 2024 Masters will be his 40th and final Masters.

Just remember to tune in early on Sunday to hear Nantz describe the pink azaleas and beautifully sunsoaked skies and so on "....AT THE MASTERS."

If becoming a better golfer is one of your goals, Gregory Kelley, MD, has some sound advice. "A flexible, mobile body not only improves your performance, it also helps prevent injury," says Dr. Kelley, a board-certified physical medicine and rehabilitation physician at Summit Sports Medicine & Orthopaedic Surgery. As an avid golfer and a physician who treats individuals affected by sports injuries and other causes, he understands which habits can make or break your game.

"There are many simple, yet effective ways to be a better golfer while avoiding the repetitive injuries common to this sport," Dr. Kelley says. "Incorporate these habits into your weekly routine and you'll extend your longevity in the game."

Good form, Dr. Kelley says, is the foundation of golf. "You can prevent the back problems that often plague golfers by being aware of body mechanics. Conditioning the muscles unique to the golf swing is very important. Put the work in before the round so you not only play better but prevent injury."

As you would with any sport, warm up before practice or play. Dr. Kelley explains, "It is tempting to go immediately to the range or course and start hitting balls without much warm up. Try to view your warm up as not only something that will prevent injury and decrease stress on your body, but as something to improve your game. For example, if your back is stiff, you are not unlikely to achieve a full rotation on your backswing and may not be able to maintain your posture through the hitting zone."

To optimize your swing, speed and distance, he advises golfers to develop a strong, flexible core. "Strengthening your abdomen and stabilizing back muscles, as well as the muscles involved in trunk rotation, is often overlooked. Low back problems are the number one cause of injury in the game, so it is important to do everything we can to prevent these injuries from occurring."

Strong, stable hips and legs are also key. "The lower body is the powerhouse of the golf swing. A strong base is the foundation for which you will generate power. Not only will this allow for more distance, but with more balance and stability throughout the entire swing sequence," Dr. Kelley says. "If you are unsure what specific exercises are best for you, visiting with a physical therapist or trainer familiar with golf specific exercises can be a good place to start."

For cardiovascular conditioning, Dr. Kelley recommends walking the course if you are able. "Not only will this help you build strength and lose weight, but it may help you gain new insights and appreciation of the course you are playing and allow you to gather your thoughts before the next swing. Consider alternating golf days with a consistent walking, cycling, running or swimming routine."

And even longtime golfers benefit from refresher lessons. "A professional instructor will not only fine tune your technique, but they can also identify nuances in your form that could help or hinder your game and your body," Dr. Kelley adds.








Ranking SEC Coaches By Robert Craft



t's the pollen-covered cars spring, which means March Madness and head coach rankings!

For the uninitiated, these lists are totally subjective. This is meant to be a fun exercise, and it's my ranking.

While career achievements are considered, college football has become a sport that's constantly changing, so recent performance (wins, recruiting, working the transfer portal, hiring assistants, producing NFL Draft picks, etc.) will be taken into account.

Entering the 2024 season, the SEC features two new teams (so two more coaches to rank), and two new head coaches at Texas A&M and Mississippi State.

No. 1 Kirby Smart, Georgia: Smart is the undisputed top-ranked coach in America right now. He's won at least 11 games in six of the last seven years, has a pair of national titles and just inked another No. 1 recruiting class.

Georgia has sent more talent to the NFL than any program in the country in the last few seasons, and the Bulldogs

No. 2 Brian Kelly, LSU: Kelly has done everything but win a national championship at the FBS level. ## SCHEDULING FOR MONEY

**SEC Adding More Games?** By Robert Craft



he SEC is likely to stay with an eight-game football schedule for the 2025 season, but that could be the final year before going to nine games, according to Texas athletic director Chris Del Conte.

The main news: the SEC is sticking with an eight-game schedule for the 2025 season. There was no confirmation from the SEC office or anyone else at the town hall event Del Conte spoke at.

Several conference sources emphasized that there has been no official decision either way on the 2025

season or beyond.

But indications are the SEC does not want to have its annual meetings in Destin, Fla., this May be dominated by another debate about the future schedule format. The conference could announce well before that it's going with an eightgame schedule for 2025, then make a decision later for 2026 and beyond.

When Oklahoma and Texas announced they were joining the league a few years ago, the momentum was toward going to a nine-game schedule. But that

momentum stalled mainly because ESPN did not agree to increase payout to the SEC in exchange for adding a ninth team would have three teams it plays game.

At last year's spring meetings, the SEC announced it would keep an eight-game schedule for the 2024 season. That was the first eight-game schedule for Texas and Oklahoma, and it postponed the long-awaited decision on whether to go to nine.

The biggest reason is money. Even schools that favor a nine-game schedule, such as Georgia, have wanted ESPN to increase its payout in exchange.

The television contract, which was signed about six months before Oklahoma and Texas announced they were joining, just has a pro rata clause, which means the payout goes up by an equal amount to what the current 14 schools were getting.

This year, while the SEC stayed with eight games, it kept those traditional rivalries as rotating games. That could

be done again in 2025.
